What is Late French Immersion?

Late French Immersion is a program designed for students whose first language is not French.

Late French Immersion begins in grade 7 and continues until grade 12.

Why Learn French?

- * Canada's official languages are French and English
- * Strengthens problem-solving, reasoning and creative thinking skills
- * Helps develop understanding and appreciation of other cultures
- * Provides more opportunities in a global job market

Curriculum Outcomes

Late French Immersion students follow the same curriculum as English program students in Nova Scotia with the expectation of meeting the same outcomes.

Grade 7 LFI students will take 70-75% of their courses in French.

Is Late French Immersion the Right Choice For Your Child?

- * Does your child enjoy French? Is she/he interested in being immersed in the language?
- * Is your child ready for a challenge?

What to Expect Entering French Immersion

- * Teachers will give students the tools to help them communicate in French
- * Students quickly start to acquire the language
- * It is natural for the student to sometimes feel overwhelmed
- * Students will develop a sense of pride and accomplishment with their new language

Language Acquisition

Students acquire French language skills through:

- * Teacher modelling and instruction
- * Authentic opportunities to communicate and interact
- * Linking oral language, reading and writing

The role of the FSL parent

- * As parents you need to be patient as well!
Language learning takes place over a period of time.
- * Students will learn at different rates depending on their aptitude, work habits, motivation and organization.
